Spend 45 minutes on questions 1 - 8 and 15 minutes on Question 9.

You must attempt Question 9, which is a writing task, even if you have not finished the reading comprehension.

The screen was lit up, and it said: “Today’s arithmetic lesson is on the addition of proper fractions. Please insert yesterday’s homework in the proper slot.”

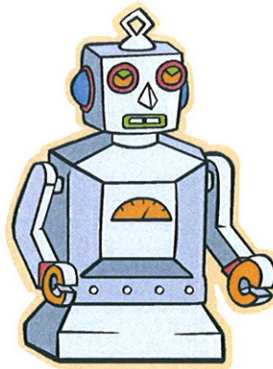

6. How do we learn that Margie's mother is quite strict? (2)
7. Give the meaning of each underlined word as it is used in the story. Then identify the part of speech of each word as it is used in the story.
For example: sigh breathe out in an unhappy way noun
a) regular b) screamed c) nonchalantly (3)
8. Isaac Asimov wrote this story in 1955. What changes would you make to his description of the 'teacher' taking into consideration modern inventions and developments in technology? State in each case what Asimov refers to and how it would have changed if the story was written today. (4)
